## RULES GOVERNING THE SHOW

1. Exhibitors need not be members of the Kingston Horticultural Society. **Anyone may enter** except for those who make a substantial part of their income from growing, selling or arranging flowers and/or vegetables.
2. Exhibits must be entered and in place between **8:30 and 10:30 a.m.** on Saturday, June 16<sup>th</sup> and **must** remain in place until **5.30 p.m.** the same day. **Exhibitors must leave the display area promptly at 10:30 a.m.** ENTRIES ARRIVING LATER THAN 10:30 a.m. WILL NOT QUALIFY FOR JUDGING.

### Judging

3. Judging will begin at 11.00 a.m.
4. No exhibit will be awarded a prize unless the judge considers it to have sufficient merit even if it is the only entry in the class. Any protests of the judges' decisions must be made in writing, and given to a show convener by 2:00 p.m.
5. Judging will be in accordance with the *Ontario Judging & Exhibiting Standards for Horticultural and Design*, 2003 edition. Please refer to it for definitions and information. It is a very helpful book. It is available from Wendy Bryant for \$5.00.

### General

**All exhibitors must report to the registrar upon arrival.  
Failure to do so may result in disqualification.**

Exhibitor numbers are available in advance from Adrian Cooper, or on the day of the show.

6. Exhibitors must complete and attach entry tags to each entry. Tags may be obtained at the door, in advance at the June meeting or from the Show Chair Coordinators.
7. Classes, **56N** & **66N** are for **Novices**, someone who has never won a first place ribbon in Horticultural at a major show; **80N** is for Novices in the Design section. **19F** & **69F** are for someone whose has not entered the June Show before.

If, for example, you enter **56N**, you cannot also enter **56**. This exclusion applies to all five classes.

8. Exhibitors must provide their own containers, except for the Rose classes. The Society will provide white vases. All rose entries must be displayed in vases provided. Paper plates for the vegetables, and water for all exhibits, will be provided. Staging tables will be provided.
9. **Moving entries other than your own is not permitted.** The show convenors reserve the right to shift entries where necessary, or subdivide any classes. Due care will be taken of the exhibitors' property, but the Society will not be responsible for any loss or damages.
10. Prize ribbons will be awarded to the winners in each class. Aggregate points prizes will be awarded in some sections based on 5 points for a first, 3 for a second, 2 for a third and 1 for honourable mention. Honourable mentions are not awarded in all classes, but only where the judge(s) deem it appropriate.
11. Trophies will be presented at the November KHS Monthly meeting. They remain in the possession of the Society and are on display in the Kingston Frontenac Public Library, Main Branch. Names of the winners will be posted by 3 p.m. on Show day.

### **Horticultural**

12. Exhibits must have been grown the exhibitor. Plants must be free of pests and diseases; they may be removed to avoid contaminating other plants.
13. Exhibitors are asked to name, if possible, the variety on entry tags for educational purposes only. Reference material will be available at the Registrar's table. Pre-printed address labels speed up the filling out the entry tag. Don't forget your exhibitor number.
14. Buds showing colour will be counted as a bloom.
15. In classes **19 & 28** flowers must be able to float freely.
16. Plant material must not be dyed, tinted or painted. Cedar, or other material, may be used inconspicuously (not showing above the top of the vase) to better present flowers for judging. Only the plants own foliage may be visible.
17. When a class requires multiple blooms/stems they may be different colours and different varieties (cultivars). But it is best if they are the same variety and colour as points are given for uniformity.
18. **All African Violets must be single-crown** (leaves form around a single point) plants **except** for the trailing variety.

19. Classes **64, 67-68** may contain more than one plant if they are the same variety. Classes **69-70** may contain different species, as well as different varieties.

20. Entries in classes **60-72 and 90** must have been in the exhibitor's possession before **March 21<sup>st</sup>, 2008**, and may be in hanging baskets. To be eligible for the S. Anglin & Co. Ltd. Trophy the plant hanger must be visible.

21. **TIPS:** If possible, flowers should be cut early on Friday morning, before the heat of the sun desiccates them; otherwise, on Friday evening. A bucket of tepid water should be taken into the garden, and stems should be placed in it up to their necks. Roses and hard stemmed blooms should be recut under water. Flowers should be left in the water in the basement or a cool shady place until Saturday morning. A few flowers, those with hollow stems or those, which exude latex, require special treatment. In most flower classes, parts of the judge's marks are awarded for foliage so, where possible, some upper leaves should be left in place when cutting the flowers. Lower leaves should be removed.

**Container plants** - Proper grooming helps to put your plant in show condition. Remove dead and damaged flowers and leaves, keeping the overall look of the plant in mind. Foliage must not be oiled or shined. Removal of dust is suggested. If supports are needed, they should be inconspicuous. Wiring, tying and staking are only permitted in classes **60-72 and 90**. Plants are to be displayed in the container in which it was grown. Remember, the look of the pot contributes to the overall presentation of the plant. If needed the plant may be transferred to a pot of the same size. Containers should be an appropriate size for its plant.

Classes **73-78** are judged on compatibility of plants, arrangement. Please list the plants name and light conditions for the container.

22. Succulents (classes **66 & 66N**) are plants that are very drought resistant; their leaves hold moisture. Some examples are: sedums, hoya (wax plant), aloe, kalanchoe, Senecio (string of pearls), agave, jade, euphorbia and many others.

### **Design (previously Decoratives)**

23. The exhibitor must have arranged all designs. Material for the Design division may be obtained from any source. Fresh plant material must be predominant, unless otherwise stated.

24. No artificial plant material is allowed. Fresh plant material in exhibits must not be dyed, tinted or painted unless the class specifies otherwise. Dried plant material and decorative wood may be painted. Accessories are permitted. Decorative gravel, stones, etc. are permitted; soil is not, unless otherwise stated.

25. Designs are to be viewed from one side only; width and depth must **not exceed 75 cm.** and are displayed on a White tablecloth and against a Cream background unless otherwise indicated.

26. A portion of the judge's marks will be based on interpretation of the title.
